GI-BMPs



- Green Industries Best Management Practices (GI-BMPs) training required for all commercial fertilizer applicators by January 1, 2014
- Developed by FDEP, UF/IFAS and the Green Industries to protect water resources
 - Consists of five modules: Overview; Lawn
 & Landscape; Irrigation; Fertilizers;
 Pesticides



GI-BMPs



- Two-pronged (supply and demand)
 approach for promotion: promote
 training to landscape companies and
 encourage homeowners to seek a
 certified professional
- Multi-county collaboration (Citrus, Hernando, Pasco, Sumter) to offer monthly trainings at rotating locations
 - In 2011, the team trained 36% of all professionals certified in Florida





- 183 programs reaching 8,165 youth
 - Week-long environmental education camp
 - In-school programs
 - Garden programs for Lecanto Primary School classes
 - Exhibits at science fairs
- Soil science, composting, the Floridan aquifer, sinkholes, indoor water conservation, pollution, habitats
- All participants receive a water flow bag, leak detector tablets and wildflower seeds to use at home









































- Rain Barrels (since 2007)
 - 29 workshops with 676 participants
 and 703 rain barrels sold

- Worm Composting (since 2009)
 - 19 workshops with 472 participants and 297 worm composting bins assembled

















- National household survey of 12,000 people conducted by George Mason University found that the best indicator of pro-environmental behavior was NOT
 - Education level
 - Age
 - Socioeconomic Status
 - Race/ethnicity
