


CARES Act CDBG-CV Round 2 Allocation Methodology for Florida Communities

The State of Florida's CDBG-CV Round 2 allocation methodology uses a formula that acknowledges a baseline level of housing and community development needs and accounts for geographic differences in COVID impacts (both health and economic impacts), as illustrated in the following figure.

The following factors were used to determine the maximum funding available for entitlement communities individually and for Florida non-entitlement areas collectively:

- **Baseline needs** The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Federal Fiscal Year 2020 distribution methodology (40% weight) is used as a proxy for existing housing and community development needs and broad housing and community development needs. This indicator represents populations that are most vulnerable to housing and economic challenges in general and related to the ongoing impacts of COVID-19.
- **COVID Economic impacts**—Re-employment insurance claims between March 7 and July 31 less the aggregate count of claims during the same period last year

(30% weight in funding formula). This indicator captures the economic impacts related to COVID-19 shutdowns and slowdowns across various industries and job markets.

■ **COVID Health impacts**—Total number of confirmed coronavirus cases as of July 31, 2020 (30% weight). This indicator is a direct measure of health impacts, using confirmed resident cases for each community.

Maximum funding amounts for each CDBG entitlement community are shown in the following figure.
